What Is The Veterans Service Commission?

In 1886, the Ohio Legislature passed an act establishing the Soldiers Relief Commission. Each of the 88 counties in Ohio has a board of five honorably discharged veterans appointed to administer veteran programs in their respective county. Operating expenses are provided through county real estate taxes. In 1986, the Soldiers Relief Commission was renamed the Veterans Service Commission. Our role is to oversee the operation of the veterans Service Office; to provide temporary financial assistance to indigent veterans, spouse, dependent children and surviving spouses; and to assist veterans in obtaining earned benefits from the Federal, state and local levels of government.

What Can My Veterans Service Office Do For Me?

Your Hancock County Veterans Service Office is primarily available to help you or your families to understand benefits which include:

- 1. Exit from Service
- 2. Soldier/Sailor Relief Fund
- 3. Nursing Home Benefits
- 4. Education Benefits
- 5. Survivor Benefits
- 6. Counseling
- 7. Disability Benefits
- 8. Transportation
- 9. VA Home Loans
- 10. Prescriptions

Eligibility for most benefits is determined by the Veterans Administration office in Cleveland. The Veterans service Officer can either help in the application process to receive veteran's benefits or refer you or your family members to other Hancock County agencies for assistance. To best determine the service available to you and your family, meet with the Hancock County Veterans Service Officer. The Officer can provide a detailed explanation of all service-related benefits, eligibility requirements, and assistance with the application process. The Veterans Service Commission organizes the Memorial Day Parade and the Veterans Day Parade and other projects/events to assist Veterans. They also do the planning for the wreath ceremony at the Bridge on Memorial Day.

The organization also helps active and discharged military families and donates to local charities. Membership is open to U.S. citizens who are veterans (regular members and governing body); currently serving in the U.S. military or have an honorable discharge; must have served overseas during a conflict and received an expeditionary medal, a campaign medal or ribbon, or imminent danger/hostile fire pay; and/or served 30 consecutive days duty in Korea or 60 days of non-consecutive duty in Korea; and/or be currently deployed in an area that qualifies for VFW membership.
